## **JULY 2021**


When the snow came and disappeared just as quickly as it arrived.



## Matariki

Last week at Country Kidz we celebrated Matariki as a centre. Matariki is known as the Maori new year and is the time of year the Māori calendar restarts. Matariki is about celebration and spending time with Whānau. There is a cluster of stars that appears in the sky during this time, which is know as Matariki.

Traditionally Matariki was known as a way for Māori people to know when to plant their crops, and how the season would go. If the stars shone bright the harvest season would do well, if the stars shone dull, the season wouldn be less productive.

As an ECE it is important we use Matariki as an opportunity to teach the Māori Culture and the importance of diversity.

Because Matariki emphasises the importance of coming together with family, friends, and the community, we decided to invite all our families to share a Hāngi with us. It was lots of fun making and cooking the hāngi with our tamariki, then they were able to come back and share the cooked kai with their whānau.

We carried out lots of activities throughout the week to celebrate, there were lots of arts and crafts completed, we decorated stars to go on our wall display. We also made kites and flew them. The significance of flying kites during Matariki is the belief that they deliver messages to those who are no longer with us.

Our 4 year olds were able to participate in a sleepover as part of the celebrations, where they were able to search for Matariki, although unfortunately the weather wasn't perfect for star gazing.
